

Society of Kentucky Lepidopterists
Louisville, KY Nov. 20-21, 1987

At 8:00 P.M. the annual party was held at the Covells', 2333 Brighton Drive, Louisville, KY. There were 45 members and their guests or family members attending. Covell showed some slides of field trips from Bullitt Co. in April and Big Black Mtn. in July.

Saturday, November 21. The group convened to recommence the workshop at 9:30 A.M. at 321 Life Sciences Building at the University of Louisville. The

Millers presented a program on curatorial techniques, and Jackie demonstrated spreading techniques with the "block method". Some of the group tried spreading specimens on conventional spreading boards.

This workshop ended at about 12:30 P.M., when there was a break for lunch. The time was used by some for exchanging information and material, bidding on books and other items in the silent auction, and purchasing from the "Ohio Lepidopterists Sales Program".

At 1:40 P.M. the annual business meeting was called to order by President Eric Metzler. Announcements included John Calhoun's invitation to the January meeting of the Ohio Lepidopterists at John Peacock's research facility north of Columbus on the weekend of January 16. He also spoke on the progress of the Ohio butterfly faunal project, which will soon result in a book. Covell gave the treasurer's report, which was accepted. Mike McInnis briefly reviewed the past year's publications, and thanked those who contributed articles. He again called for more member participation in providing information and articles for publication. Loran Gibson reviewed the field trips held in April (Bearcamp Road spot and Green Swamp, N.C.); Big Black Mountain in July; and Pennyridge Forest State Park area in August.

Elections were held next. John Calhoun and Roy Rings were nominated

for President; and in a secret ballot, Roy was elected for 1988. As the current Secretary/Treasurer, Editor, and Field Trip Coordinator were the only nominees for their offices, Covell, McInnis and Gibson were returned to office.

In old business, production of the new decals and the need to reprint the pocket field list of Kentucky butterflies were discussed. No action was taken.

New business included a motion to raise dues to \$8 per year. It died for lack of a second. A motion to raise dues to \$5 per annum was then made, seconded, and passed unanimously. We agreed to change the billing date to the first of the year next year, to avoid the confusion of billing in July. Covell pointed out that many members on our mailing list have as yet not paid their dues for 1988. We agreed that the \$5 rate will go into effect for 1989 (except for those who have already paid dues beyond 1988).

Field trips for 1988 were discussed. Tentative decisions were made for a visit to Otter Creek Park and nearby areas in April, and the Pennyrile State Forest in May. A trip to the Henderson Sloughs area in late summer will be planned by Richard Henderson. The importance of studying butterfly recovery in areas affected by fires in 1987 and by timber removal disturbance (as at the Bearcamp Road spot) was discussed.

Covell mentioned that the Kentucky Survey stood at 2,189 species of Lepidoptera, and that more records are needed. We stand to add some as a result of new material collected by Loran Gibson and John Nordin.

Following a break, the Program was presented. Lee Miller spoke on "The Edwards types: A curatorial nightmare". He gave a biography of William Henry Edwards, and explained how Edwards would often replace

original specimens on which names are based with better ones, confusing the identity of type specimens. Methods of tracing these problems and resolutions of some of them were described and illustrated. Next, Jackie Miller introduced us to the morphology, life history, and taxonomy of the moth family Castniidae - the large day-flying moths of the neotropics and other tropical regions. John Calhoun presented a slide-illustrated account of Phoebis sennae eubule captures, mating behavior, and breeding sites in Ohio during 1987; when many new county records were added as that species exploded northward for the first time in recent history. Leland Martin showed a rare book from his library: a copy of Butterfly Fauna of Ceylon ascribed to Brigadier Evans. Charlie Covell finished the program with a slide-illustrated travelogue of the March 1987 collecting trip to Santa Catarina, Parana, and Rondonia Brazil.

The door prizes were distributed by Covell. There were exactly enough prizes for everyone attending! After drawing for the door prizes, the meeting adjourned. Twenty of the group met for dinner at Masterson's Restaurant.


