# SUMMER FIELD TRIP TO PENNYRILE STATE FOREST

FIELD TRIP LEADER: Loran Gibson

**DATES: 21, 22 & 23 May 2004** 

**LOCATIONS:** Vicinity of Dawson Springs, KY; Pennyrile Forest State Park; Pennyrile State Forest; and Tradewater Wildlife Management Area; Christian and Hopkins Counties KY.

**DIRECTIONS**: Follow Western Kentucky Parkway to Dawson Springs exit. Turn south on KY 109. Follow KY 109 into Dawson Springs and turn right (west) on US Rt. 62 and KY 109. Follow US Rt. 62 and KY109 into the center of town and then turn left (south) on KY 109 again. Follow KY 109 for approximately six miles and turn right (west) at the Pennyrile Forest State Park sign. Follow the main park road to the Pennyrile Lodge sign and turn right to the Lodge.

ACCOMMODATIONS: Camping is available at Pennyrile Forest State Park on a first-come-first-served basis. Fee is approximately \$12.00 / night, \$3.00 per additional person. Motels in the area are scarce. I will list three here: Pennyrile Lodge in the State Park is very nice, and in high demand. Make reservations early if you expect to stay in the Lodge or Cabins. Lodge rooms are \$59.95-\$69.95 per night. Cabins rent for \$99.95 per night for a one bedroom, \$117.95 for a two bedroom. The toll-free reservations number is: 800-325-1711. The Springs Inn is a tiny motel located in the town of Dawson Springs. I do not have details on this establishment at this time, but it looks clean from the road. The Stratton Inn in Princeton, KY (a few miles west on Western Kentucky Parkway, at exit 12) is very nice for the price of \$44.00 - \$53.00 per night. For information / reservations call 270-365-2828.

**RESTAURANTS:** The Lodge Restaurant in the State Park is open for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Dawson Springs has a few fast food restaurants including a Hardees and a Dairy Queen. There are also a couple of local restaurants.

ITINERARY: Friday evening (21 May), 6:00 p.m. Central Time, 7:00 p.m. Eastern Time. Meet at the Lodge in the State Park for discussing plans for black lighting. We have no permit for collecting on State Park property, so all collecting sites will be in the nearby State Forest and Wildlife Management areas. Those wishing to dine together could have dinner at the Lodge Restaurant.

Saturday morning (22 May), 9:30 a.m. Central Time, 10:30 a.m. Eastern Time. Meet at the Lodge in the State Park for planning the day's search for butterflies. This hour should give moth collectors time to collect their traps from Friday night, and late arrivals ample time to drive to the Park. Bring your own lunch and water. We will be within a few miles of the Park and Dawson Springs for the whole day.

Saturday Evening (22 May), 6:00 p.m. Central Time, 7:00 p.m. Eastern Time. Meet at the Lodge once again to make plans for evening black lighting.

Sunday Morning (23 May), 9:00 a.m. Central <u>Time</u>, 10:00 Eastern Time. Meet at the Lodge in the Park to plan the day.

A NOTE ABOUT TICKS: This area of Kentucky has a substantial population of the Lonestar Tick (Amblyoma americanum). At this time of year you may find three sizes of these ticks, six legged nymph, eight legged nymph, and adult. All three are blood suckers. The two sizes of nymphs are the so-called seed ticks or turkey mites. Please bring plenty of insect repellent with high proportions of deet. Spraying an complete outfit of outdoor clothing (socks, pants, & shirt) with Permanone type insect repellent at least 24 hours before going into the field is the best defense against these pests. Permanone is a Pyrethrin-like product available at Walmart and other stores. It must be applied to clothing and then be allowed to dry before wearing the clothes. This product actually kills ticks. It is always a good idea to keep pants cuffs tucked inside socks and shirttails tucked inside of pants.

Hopefully, we will have good weather and be able to find some of the interesting species of butterflies and moths known to occur here.

The following is a list of butterflies collected or observed in the area during last years summer field meeting: Epargyreus clarus, Achalarus lyciades, Thorybes pylades, Erynnis icelus, E. brizo, Nastra

lherminier, Ancyloxypha numitor, Polites themistocles, Wallengrenia egeremet, Pompeius verna, Poanes hobomok, Poanes zabulon, Euphyes ruricola. Atrytonopsis hianna, Amblyscirtes hegon, A. vialis, A. belli, Battus philenor, Pterourus glaucus, P.troilus, Eurytides marcellus, Pieris rapae, Colias eurytheme, Eurema nicippe, Satyrium calanus falacer, Satyrium favonius ontario, Parrhasius m-album, Celastrina neglecta, Speyeria cybele, Polygonia interrogationis, Polygonia comma, Vanessa atalanta, Phyciodes tharos, Chlosyne nycteis, Liminitis arthemis astyanax, Anaea andria, Asterocampa celtis, Enodia creola, Satyrodes appalachia, Hermeuptychia sosybius, and Megisto cymela. We encourage you to bring light traps, bait traps and pheromone traps. There are numerous habitats for the use of traps. Especially pheromone traps for Sesiid moths. This is a poorly known family from the state and could produce numerous state records.

Please be conservative with collections of the rarer species, especially <u>Satyrium favonius ontario</u>. Give the next person a chance to enjoy the species!

Several rare moths were collected during last years meeting: <u>Catocala dulciola</u>, <u>C. connubialis</u>, <u>Grammia doris</u>, and <u>Hyparpax aurora</u>.

# THE SOCIETY AND THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

As Dr. Covell prepares to retire from the University of Louisville, the Lepidoptera collection that he amassed will be transferred to the University of Kentucky in Lexington sometime in late May or June. Leroy Koehn arranged a meeting with Michael J. Sharkey, Ph.D. 1:30PM on 30 April 2004. Jack Dempwolfe, Richard Henderson then joined Leroy for the visit to the Entomology Department at the University of Kentucky to see the new locations and meet the staff.

Dr. Sharkey provided a tour of the facility where the collection will be housed upon its arrival. During the meeting with Dr. Sharkey we learned the following.

- 1. The staff of the Entomology Department at the University of Kentucky is excited about receiving the collection. They are also excited about becoming involved with the Society of Kentucky Lepidopterist. They would like the members of the Society to continue to support the collection and as a result, we will have access to the collection. With 24 hours notice, they will provide work space, microscopes, and parking when requested.
- 2. There is no current curator for the collection. This will change in the future.
- 3. The University will establish a Research Associate Program for members who wish to work with the collection and contribute time and donate specimens.
- 4. The insect collection of the University of Kentucky will be combined with the collection of the University of Louisville. They are planning to purchase a compactor for the combined collection.
- 4. The University of Kentucky will host the 2004 Annual Meeting of the Society the 29 & 30 October 2004 at the University in Lexington.

We also met Dr. John Obrycki the Department of Entomology Chairman,. Dr. Obrycki is excited about the collection and working with the Society to continue the grow of the collection.

As the result of this meeting, we are confident that the collection will be properly cared for and that we will continue to have access. The Society will have a working relationship with the University of Kentucky and there are numerous possibilities for joint ventures.


This is a rather small newsletter. We need your help! Articles, photographs, field reports, notes and news are needed. Remember, this is your newsletter. Please contribute to it.
