2014 ANNUAL MEETING SCHEDULE

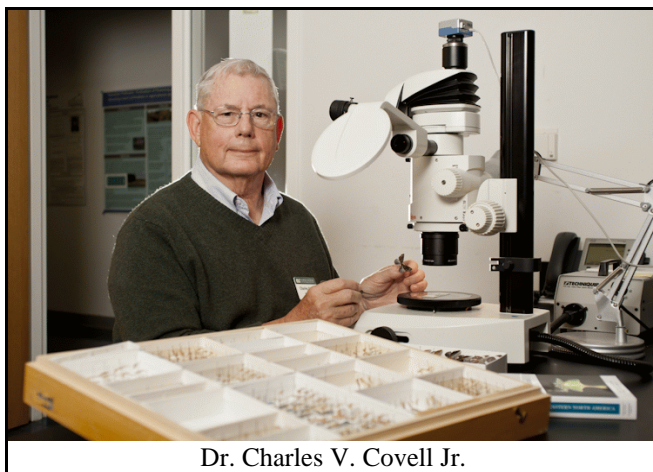
Friday, 14 November 2014

The Insect Museum at the University of Kentucky is the home of the Kentucky Lepidoptera Collection along with the University of Kentucky Insect Collection. The collections are on a compactor which reduces floor space and has ample room for future growth. The collection will be open for viewing. During the week, parking on campus is restricted and enforced. Parking options: You can leave your vehicle at the University Inn providing you are a guest. From the University Inn to the Insect Museum is a short walk. Or you can park in the University Hospital Parking Garage No.8, 110 Transcript Ave. at the 900 block of South Limestone. 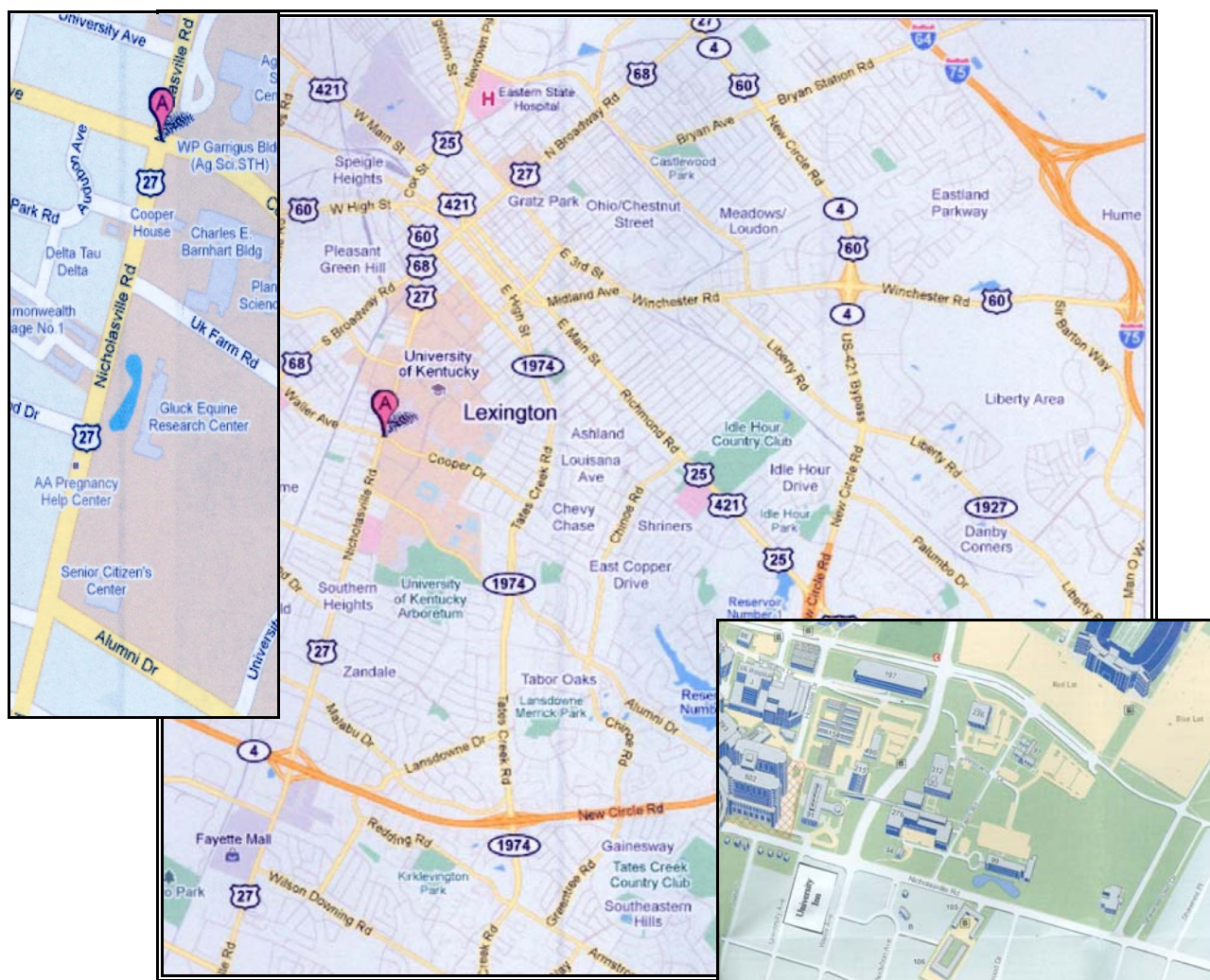
**MOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS - 2014
ANNUAL MEETING**

Once again we have made arrangements for meeting attendees to stay at the University Inn in Lexington, KY. The University Inn is directly across the street from the Agricultural Science Center North and a short walk to the Insect Museum in the Dimock Animal Pathology Building where the meeting will be held. A block of 25 rooms has been reserved until 1 November 2014 at a rate of \$83.00 or \$85.00 per night (King or two Queens). After 1 November the rooms will become available on a first come first serve basis.

The Google Map indicates the location of the Inn. Exiting I-64/75 at Exit 110, turn west on US60 (Winchester Rd.). west on US60 to New Circle Rd. (Rt.4). Turn left onto New Circle Rd. and travel south to Alumni Drive. Turn right on Alumni Drive to Nicholasville Rd.. Turn right on Nicholasville Rd., travel two blocks to Waller Avenue and the University Inn will be on the NW corner of Waller Avenue & Nicholasville Rd. (Actually, once you cross the intersection of Waller Avenue & Nicholasville Road, Nicholasville Road becomes South Limestone Ave.)

38th ANNUAL BUTTERFLY COUNT BY CHARLES V. COVELL JR

On June 21, 2014 we held the 38th Annual Butterfly Count at the usual area in Oldham County, Kentucky, near Brownsboro at the Horner Wildlife Sanctuary and Bob Horners's farm. The weather was hot and muggy, about 90 degrees, with little breeze and partly cloudy skies. There were 23 attending this time, down from the past two years. Leaders with me were Loran Gibson, Richard Henderson and Bill Black, who brought Brooke Gilley with him from western Kentucky. Megan McCarty served as my scribe. Other "regulars" included Jennifer Mansfield -Jones, Bill Pearson from the University of Louisville, Margaret Perkins, Charles Wright, David Howard, his wife and two young sons, our only youngster this year. Kristen Clark and a photographer, Amber Sigman, from the Couier Journal were there and published an article in the paper the following Wednesday.

List of species reported: 3 Epargyreus clarus, 1 Thorybes pylades, 1 Erynnis horatius, 81 Erynnis baptisiae, 18 Nastra lherminier, 4 Polites themistocles, 2 Polites origenes, 1 Wallengrenia egeremet, 2 battus philenor, 5 Pterourus glaucus, 3 Pterourus troilus, 81 Colias philodice, 206 Colias eurytheme, 5 Pieris rapae, 7 Satyrrium edwardsii, 1 Satyrrium calanus, 257 Cupido comyntas, 5 Celastrina negelecta, 1 Limenitis arthemis astyanax, 1 Limenitis archippus, 14 Speyeris cybele, 6 Asterocampa celtis, 7 Asterocampa clyton, 2 Vanessa virginiensis, 1 Cyllopsis gemma, 17 Megisto cymela and 22 Cercyonis pegala. The total was 29 species, and a total number was 779, plus 2 Pterourus troilus larvae.



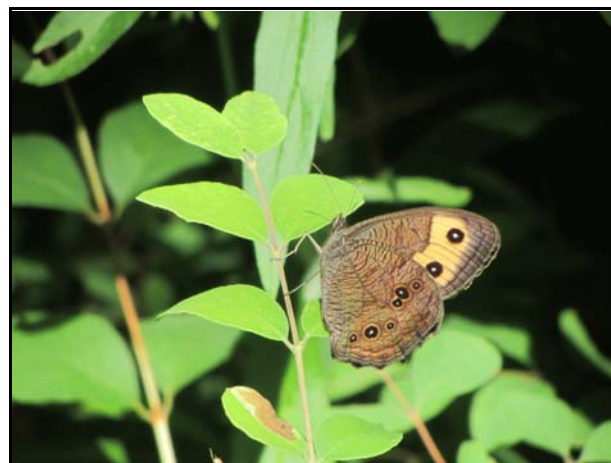

2014 OAK GROVE BUTTERFLY FESTIVAL

The Society of Kentucky Lepidopterists participated in the 2014 Oak Grove Butterfly Festival. Bill Black, Gerald Burnett, Leroy and Betty Koehn participated. The weather was perfect and an estimated 8,000 people attended the eight hour event.

A new Butterfly House, several insect related booths, food, drink, and a Monarch release, which ended the festival. The Society of Kentucky Lepidopterists booth was next to the entrance at the front of the Butterfly House.

Bill Black and Leroy Koehn tagged all the Monarchs in the Butterfly House.

There was a steady flow of people into our booth. A large display of specimens, provided by Bill Black and Leroy Koehn was a crowd pleaser.

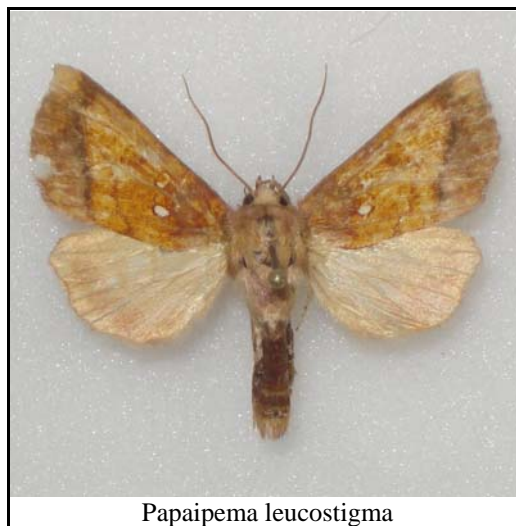
**GREAT PURPLE HAIRSTREAK

The specimen was collected at Otter Creek Recreation Area in Meade County in a Light Trap set out in a location with Columbine, the larval host plant for Papaipema leucostigma. The specimen is worn indicating it has been on the wing for sometime. The flight season may be mid-August. Your Editor has collected Papaipema leucostigma in southern Indiana on 12 August 2012 and 15 August 2013.

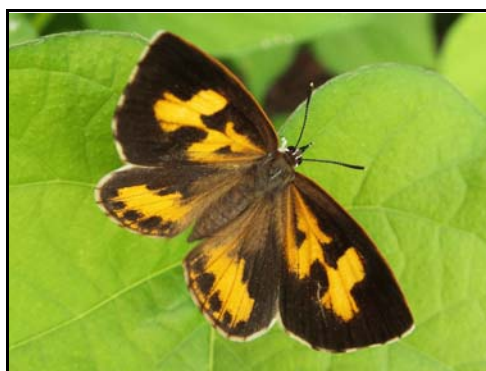
